Looks good with bat until actually facing the bowling and as a fielder he only takes catches off his own bowling, but drops a high proportion of those too. Arthur Frederick Johnson. Age in kind words. PHB WOKB. Roedean
One of the clubs senior professionals and as good a player now as he was 20 years ago - pity he wasn't a lot better then. Won wooden spoon for most ducks in 1971 with five - the five ducks being in consecutive immings on $11 \mathrm{July}, 16 \mathrm{July}, 18 \mathrm{July}$ and a pair on 19 September (all day game v. Northmet at Upshire Hall) which is still a record although equalled by Jon Davies $1974 / 75$. Scores all his runs in singles, fours \& sixes although has been known to run twos in extreme circumstances i.e. keeping Peter Amass away from strike. When not keeping wicket can field anywhere - as long as it's first slip. 140(5) Recorded Apps. 24 Ducks.
Colin Philip Johnson. Ige 20,Mental $3 \frac{1}{2}$. CHB WB. Ashmole Secondary School. early seventies Colin joined Barnet III's but rejoined Arkley in 1975 on a free transfer when a vacancy for a jolker occured with the departure of Dewi filliams. In his first full season scored 5 ducks, was 0 not out 6 times and gave away all but 6 of his 45 runs with 39 wides. In 1976 how--ever he confounded everybody by not only avoiding a duck but also topping the batting averages thanks to 9 more not out scores. Has strong throwing arm which was also used to bundle Spiney out of bed on tour in Vales circa 4am. Drops catches deliberately so that he can run batsman out as they attempt run on misfield. 45 (13) Apps. 5 Ducks.

Peter Amass played his 50 th game for Arkley. Brian Andrews played his 150th Arkley innings. Keith Pike's score of 23 was his career best. Mart Symonds was bowled second bounce by Colin Brown (and then congratulated the bowler on a "fine ball"!) Roy Watts did not face a ball. Paul Townsend and Colin Brown had hard catches dropped off their first deliveries'.

*On April 30 th (Sat) an over 23 v . under 23 practice match was staged at Brunswick Park. The teams were;
