*Brunswick Park here we come!





AFTER our unsuccessful attempt to move to Oakhill Park during the close season due to the poor state of the pitches at Barnet Playing Fields we have now secured a pitch at New Southgate Recreation Ground (Brunswick Park). For those of you who are not sure of where New Southgate Recreation Ground is there is a map on the next page which ~~will add to your confusion~~ I hope will be of use. Our first game there will be v. Northmet on Wednesday 18th June or v. Roving Reporters on Saturday 21st June depending on whether we can use the pitch in midweek. It is possible that we may have to play our home Sunday and midweek games at Barnet Playing Fields (or elsewhere) but we shall have to wait and see.

The new ground is certainly not as picturesque as Barnet Playing Fields, it has roads on two sides and the backs of houses on a third but the pitch and pavilion facilities are so much superior. The whole ground is completely flat and the table extends virtually from side to side enabling a game to be played ^{at the same time} at the same time. Thus two teams share the ground and it is thought that we will be sharing with New Southgate Social our Embassy Trophy opponents (who play at Bethune Park on Sundays) The pavilion is high above the playing level on an Oakhill Park type bank and the two are linked by a long concrete stairway which may prove too much for our senior players to climb after a long innings (i.e. more than two overs!) but if necessary we will send their tea down to them - but then again they'll have to improve their catching. If you ^{are} unfortunate enough to score a golden duck and don't fancy the embarrassment of climbing the stairs in full view you can always walk to one end of the ground (where the bank is not so steep) and return to the pavilion without being noticed so much unless some bright spark shouts out "Last man O did you say?" or "Why's Pááá 'X' going that way round?"

As well as the roads on either side there is also the King's Cross main line nearby and a childrens play area behind the pavilion so 'Spiney' Norman can forget about his 'forty winks' in the dressing room from now on (and Jon Davies can forget about his Forty winks at the wicket!) There are no parking facilities within the park as at Barnet Playing Fields but there are lay byes in Oakleigh Road South and Brunswick Park Road. These would fill up rather quickly however if there are two games being played there and then it would be necessary to park in the road. The new ground is not so central to our assorted dwellings as Barnet Playing Fields and it is not so well served by public transport (although two bus routes, 34 & 251, go right past the park gates) but I am sure Norman Gibbons, who lives just up the road to the ground is not complaining!

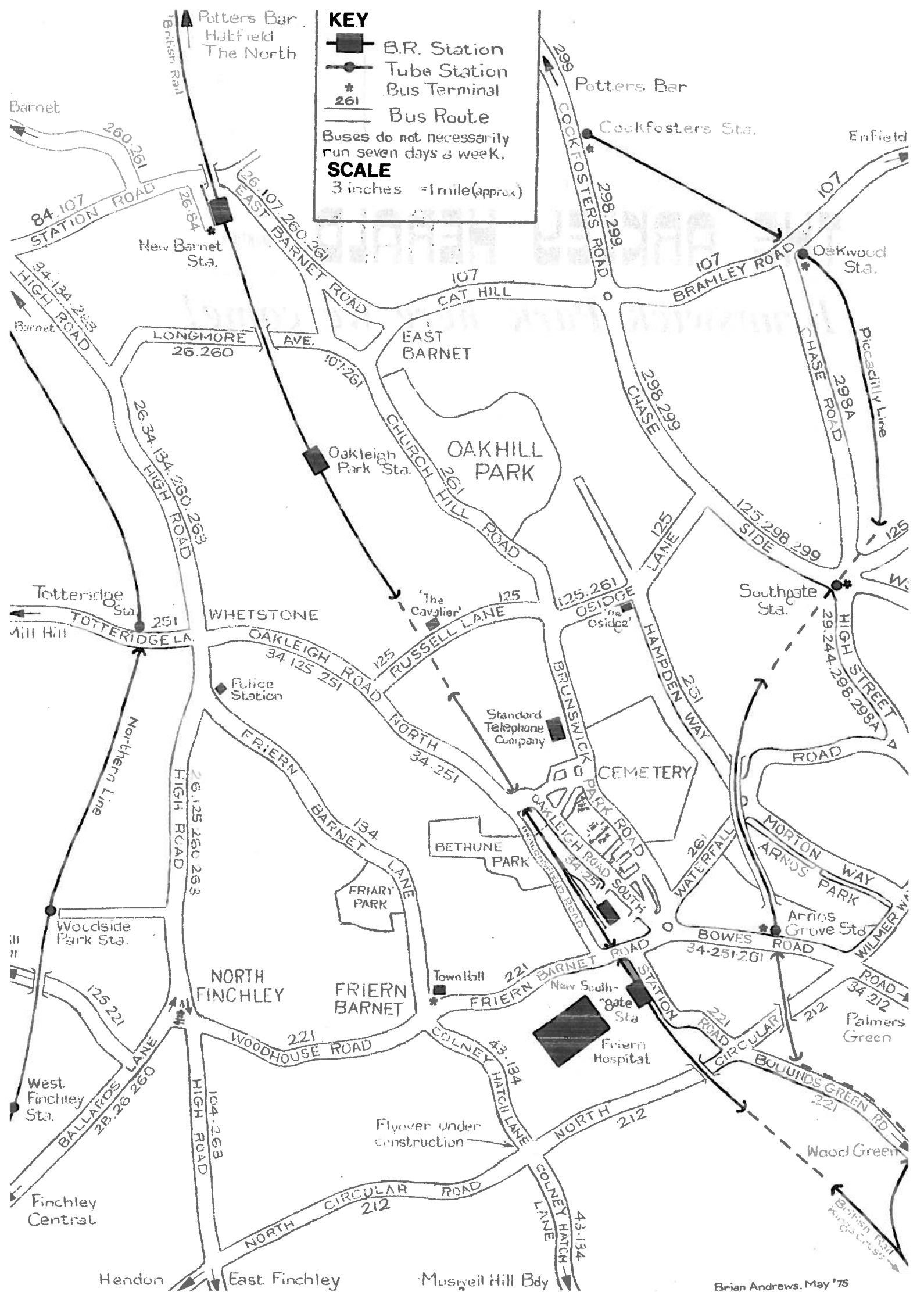

It perhaps formed our last link with Arkley itself as you could just about see Arkley from the ground as well as views of the Dollis Valley and the South Herts Golf Course. With the state of the wicket (and the football ruined outfield) it is necessary for us to move on to improve our game and to reduce the chances of a nasty accident from a fast delivery.

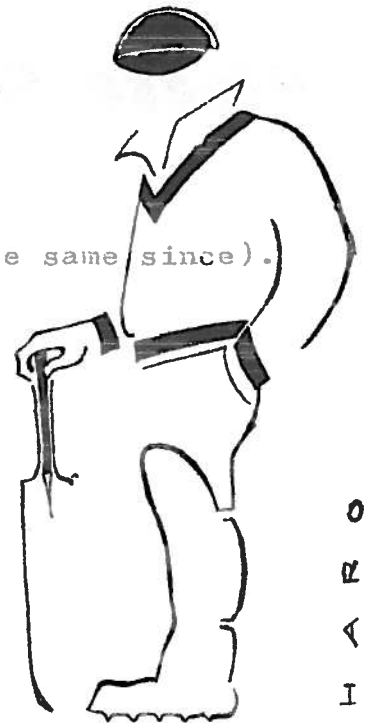
MISTAKES IN FINAL STATISTICS 1974'.

PART 3, ANOTHER FIGHT AT SQUARE LEG!

THE next batsman was one of the few wearing whites (of a sort) and he presumably had more interest and idea in the game than the rest. He played textbook forward defensive shots to the first six balls he faced but failed to connect with any of them. Frustrated by this the fat boy decided to take a run up to bowl instead of his stationary delivery. He then proceeded to bowl a succession of wides that endangered the life of the square leg fielders (there were three of them!). The batsman having forgotten his textbook ran towards square leg to hit them but never got anywhere near them. The umpire/teacher then called up the American boy to replace the fat boy as bowler. PLAY UP AND PLAY THE GAME

THE E was not exactly a breathless rush in the close at Lord's on Saturday night. West Indians are not very good at breathless rushes. But was there ever a more exciting cricket match? You don't really have to play cricket to enjoy this one-day stuff at the top level. It is even here it helps. Yet real cricket-lovers have a lot to say about it. They wonder whether the one-day game will prevent young batsmen from learning how to build a Test innings. They deplore the endless use of fast-medium bowling and defensive field-placings, both designed to contain the batsman rather than to get him out, and the virtual elimination of the spin bowler from the one-day game. All this, think they, can only damage the cricket which they really love, which proceeds at a Wagnerian pace over three or more days.

But why in fact should the one damage the other? Orchestras after all manage to play Wagner, and everyone else equally well—or almost equally well. Lloyd, for one, clearly finds all tempi to his taste. So why isn't variety be good for cricketers? Indeed, even if variety may be needed in this country, there is an awful gap between county cricket and the Test arena which one-day regional matches might help to bridge. And if fast-medium bowling is thought boring (which it may not be), why not give the batsmen a challenge by giving them more overs than they are used to see? Let them slowly creep back to their distant marks.
